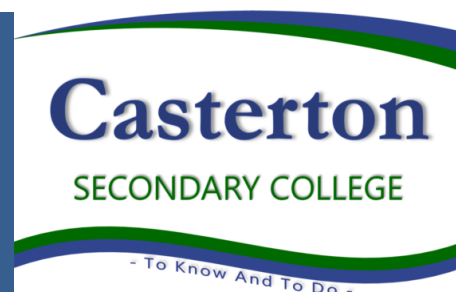

## Year 9/10 Football

On the 4<sup>th</sup> of May a select group of year 9 and 10 boys made the trek across to Pedrina Park to try their chances in the Bob Templeton Football Competition.

The boys started the first game against Good Shepherd/Balmoral with eagerness bleeding from their efforts in the first game, Charlie Jarrad showing composure beyond his years on the half-forward flank, giving teammates first use around the forward line. Casey Jones appeared to have the defensive prowess to stop his man in defence as well as running off and providing options for fellow teammates. The game concluded with Casterton Secondary College taking a 12-point win in a very low scoring affair.

The final score line was seven points Casterton’s way resulting in a second straight win.

The third match against Hamilton and Alexandra College seemed to be split down the middle with each team putting on goal after goal. Liam Sheahan was the dominant factor in the midfield with possession after possession resulting in meters gained towards Casterton’s goals. This was accompanied by the “gliding big-man” Jason Ferguson, who not only gave the midfield first use in this game but was exceptional when the ball was in air or on the ground. Hamilton Alexandra were a very even side that kept up right until the final siren, but thanks to a quick snap over the head from the lightning reflexes of Hayden Munro the game was secured by Casterton by one point.

After 3 successful wins the team needed one more to secure a chance at the almighty prize at the end of the day, coming up against the also unbeaten Heywood District Secondary College. Tom Foster was a pivotal cog in creating out of the backline and continued that as he moved into the middle of the ground, where he was first to the footy on most occasions. Will Rowlands was another standout with his ability to run straight line footy and kick long, securing multiple goals. The whole group were solid together but were outdone by a smarter and bigger team that seemed to play the percentages better overall. The end score saw Casterton going down by 18 points in the end.

# Science - S.T.E.M.

Over the past three weeks students in year seven have been working diligently within our Wind Energy STEM program at Casterton Secondary College. STEM involves a collaboration between Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics, all areas of strong employment opportunities and growth around the world.

Leading up to the Challenge Day, Year 7 students were introduced to the concept of power, voltage and current. Year 7 students were provided with STELR packs to build a hydro model which demonstrated the flow of electricity in a circuit.

Students successfully completed the task and can be seen above celebrating their achievement.

On Friday 26<sup>th</sup> May, the year seven students were faced with the challenge of assimilating all that they have learnt in class and during the excursion to Cape



Bridgewater and Keppel Prince, to answer the big question – “Can you design a wind turbine which will meet the energy requirements of your household appliances?” Students worked within their roles in cooperative groups and designed, constructed and tested their own creative wind turbine model. At the end of the day a small competition was run and the students creations were put to the test. All of the year sevens impressed and we hope that our bright minds will go on within the STEM field in future studies and vocations.

# Acting Principal's Report

## Surveys

I would like to thank those parents / care givers who responded to the recent Parent / Student / Teacher Interview survey. The results of this survey will be discussed at a staff meeting and recommendations will then be published in our next newsletter. During the next two weeks all students will be completing the **Student Attitudes to School Survey**.

We value student voice as a means to improving student engagement, wellbeing and quality instruction and to find out what your child thinks of our school. The Attitudes to School survey is an annual student survey offered by the Department of Education and Training to assist schools in gaining an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. Our school will use the survey results to plan programs and activities to improve your child's schooling experience.

Your child will complete the survey online during school hours using a purpose built secure online survey tool. It is important to note that we are not in any way "testing" your child.

Your child will be provided with a unique login to complete the survey. The student login is an assigned identifier that may be used by the Department to combine data for research purposes only. Your child's privacy and the confidentiality of your child's survey responses will be protected at all times. No identifiable personal data is included in the survey response file. The survey results will be reported back to the school in term 3. No student can be identified in the results reported to schools or in any other report of the data. The survey results will be communicated to parents through annual reporting or via our newsletter. This year the Attitudes to School survey will be conducted at our school over the period Monday 5 June to Friday 16 June. The survey only takes 20-30 minutes to complete and occurs during your child's class time.

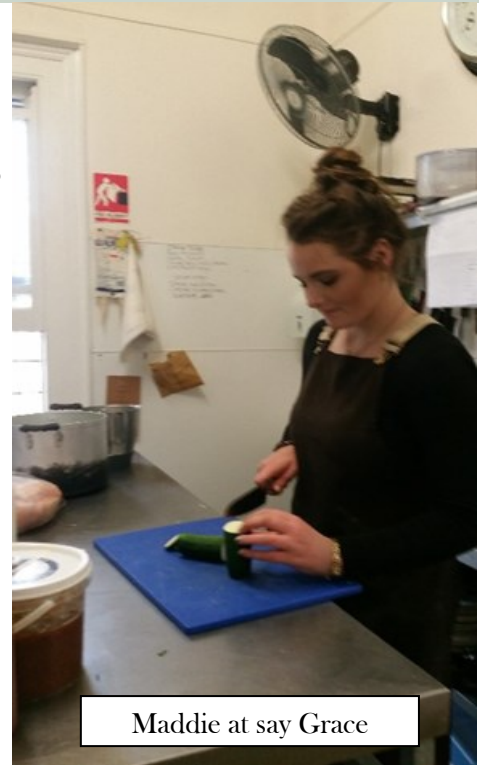

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## *Wool Overview Program - conducted by RIST Hamilton*

On Wednesday 10th May five Year 11 Students from Casterton Secondary College attended Day one of the Wool Overview Program conducted by RIST Hamilton. The trip included visits to the Wool Stores in Melbourne, an Auction of Export Wool and the Wool Museum in Geelong. The Wool Overview program complements the Sheep and Wool components of the curriculum at CSC. Students gained an insight into various roles throughout the Wool Industry and how value adding through the supply chain is completed once the wool leaves the producer. The Program concluded with two full days of shearing shed activities and learning from RIST Training Professionals.

## *Year 7 Science Excursion to Quantum*

After an early start at 5:30am, we arrived at La Trobe Quantum by 10am. The students were given an introduction on how to design 3D cars, which use CO<sub>2</sub> to race. As the year 7's have designed these before, they were jumping out of their skin to design a 3D version of one from scratch. They learnt the specifics of aerodynamics and how to design cars using Computer Aided Design (CAD) software. The students then sent their design to a 3D printer, to bring their object to life.

After lunch, they returned to see the foundations of their car design had been laid out by the 3D printer whilst they were eating. As this was happening before their very eyes, the students began testing how effective their design is at cutting through the air.

The program enhanced their knowledge for the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) program. STEM covers the inter-relationship between these areas, allowing learning to be delivered in an integrated way, helping a deeper engagement in the four disciplines.

Overall, the day was very successful and the students took away new knowledge and can use this for the STEM program.

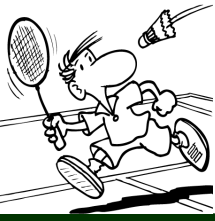
