It is pleasing to report that Meridith is at home resting and recuperating and we all wish her a speedy recovery and look forward to her return and continued leadership and commitment to CSC at the start of next term.

As the term draws to a close, it is opportune to reflect on how much has been achieved in such a short time, and how fortunate we are to have such a hard-working staff who provide our students with so many opportunities as well as a high standard of education.

Throughout the term students and staff have engaged in a variety of activities, including:

- Staff and students have been busy with the Writing/Reading programs.
- Staff have provided input into the Annual Implementation Plan monitoring process which maps the progress of the school's 2024 Key Improvement Strategies. We are on track to meet our targets.
- The Student Council approved some changes / additions to our Uniform Policy. These changes were sent by XUNO message to all parents / cares, students and staff prior to being adopted. The revised policy can be found on our website.
- Staff peer observations were completed. These provide teachers with an opportunity to observe best practice regarding providing student feedback.
- Students completed the PIVOT survey for each of their classes. These surveys provide teachers with feedback from a student perspective.
- All students completed the Student Attitudes to School Survey. We look forward to receiving the results of the survey which gives us feedback on whether students feel safe at school, are engaged with their learning, and enjoy school. We will then "unpack" the survey results to make changes where necessary to our present practices.
- Year 12 VCE students participated in revision lectures prior to their End of Semester exams.
- Year 10s attended a TAFE taster session in Hamilton.
- Year 9 students participated in the Year 9 Future Me program and Morrisby Careers Profiling.
- Year 11 students participated in the Money Matters program.
- Year 7-10 Progressive Achievement Tests (PAT) testing have been completed.
- We also welcomed Grade 5 and 6 students from our feeder schools for two very successful Partnership Days.
- All students have participated in end of semester exams which have been marked and will be included in reports.

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Excursion this term include:

- Our year 8 students and our Crew attended The Live 4 Life launch in Portland.
- Year 8 students visited Budj Bim as part of their Humanities studies and our Outdoor Ed students also visited Budj Bim.
- All year levels have attended the Noorla Yo-Long Adventure Camp which takes the students out of their comfort zone and develops resilience, teamwork and leadership skills.
- Our year 7 & 8 debating teams went to a training session in Hamilton.
- Year 7, 8 and 10 students visited the Casterton Wannon Water facility.

Sporting commitments this term include:

- The very successful Glenelg Distract Cross Country which we hosted on a challenging track involving our school farm.
- The Greater Western Region Cross Country.

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WHOLE SCHOOL NOORLA YO-LONG EXCURSIONS

The excursion to Noorla Yo-Long is designed to challenge students through a series of carefully curated activities, and scenarios. Noorla Yo-Long is run by the South Australian Police and is aimed at education, recreation & self-discovery. It is the most advanced life skill training facility in Australia. Students engage in different exercises aimed at enhancing their problem-solving abilities, communication skills, and leadership potential. From trust-building games to strategic planning sessions, every moment was an opportunity for growth and pushing personal boundaries.

One notable activity is navigating the high ropes where some students must overcome their fears to get off the ground and step upward to some great heights, but seeing the look of success when they have made it to the top and crossed the rope is fantastic. Another activity is the "Leadership Labyrinth," where students had to navigate a complex maze using only verbal instructions from their team leaders. This exercise emphasizes the importance of clear communication, trust, and collaborative problem-solving.



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
DEBATING

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WANNON WATER TREATMENT PLANT EXCURSION

This term students from Years 7-10 visited the Wannon Water plant in Casterton to find out about the water we use every day: where it comes from, how it's treated and what we can do to use it more efficiently. Wannon Water opened this facility to the public to celebrate World Environment Day The excursion was an eye-opening look into a complex process that we take for granted every time we turn on a tap.

Students learned about how in our region mineral-rich water comes from an aquifer and must be purified

via several stages. The process of coagulation was demonstrated and explained on a small scale before students went on a tour of the plant, looking into the huge vats and storage tanks where water is treated and stored. Perhaps the biggest surprise was that it passes through a big "geobag" that slowly fills up with sediment until it begins to look like a cross between a garden and a trampoline pillow!

The excursion supported the science and humanities programs and was a valuable contribution to students' understanding of chemical processes and the water cycle.

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
DOCTORS IN SCHOOL
